Making Plans – Weather

Camano's greatest risk for a disaster is severe weather. Understanding weather can help you become better prepared.

Information for this portion of our newsletter comes from NW Meteorologist Ted Buehner; from NOAA; from the National Weather Service; from Island County Department of





Emergency Management; and from the Climate Prediction Center.

We have been fortunate thus far this summer, as temperatures have not fallen into the predicted above average range. That may well change as we move into August and September. Please keep in mind the need to protect yourself from heat exhaustion, heat stroke, and the hazards of wildfire smoke. Also remain mindful of the hazard of cold water shock and potential drowning when attempting to cool off in our very cold lakes, rivers, and the Puget Sound.

Summer heat brings us to the most pressing issue at present, which is the continuation of the exceedingly dry conditions. This has resulted in the current Type 2 burn ban for Island County. During Type 2 burn bans, no outdoor burning is permitted. This means no recreational fires and no propanefueled firepits. Barbecue grills are permitted but require close supervision.

Please obey these restrictions and please refrain from using weed burners. Under such dry conditions, fire from weed burners tends to ignite surrounding vegetation and can quickly get out of control.

For an additional weather-related offering this month, I refer you to the USGS website — www.usgs.gov/apps/hera/. This site provides tools which, when launched, provide maps and exposure data regarding coastal flooding, coastal ground water, shoreline change, and a multi-hazard viewer. All information is based on storm and sea level rise scenarios. For those of us living on an island, particularly if we live near the water, this information could prove invaluable.

Disaster Communications Why Ham Radio is Important!

The following article was posted in a July 2025 ARRL (Amateur Radio Relay League) publication and demonstrates the critical nature of amateur radio in times of disaster.

Amateur Radio Volunteers Serving During Texas Floods

ARES volunteers were embedded with local service agencies in the areas of central Texas affected by devastating floods. Activated on Friday, July 4, 2025, they provided communications capabilities to agencies whose primary systems were damaged in the flooding event or where they suffer poor connectivity due to the terrain. They also helped the American Red Cross with setup of a reunification shelter in response to the floods. Ten hams were assigned to search-and-rescue teams. Dozens of health and welfare messages were passed by ham radio operators who provided a critical link when phone lines were overwhelmed. "A lot of this is tied to circuit overload preventing folks from making direct contact with family members in the area," said Kevin McCoy, KF5FUZ.

During the flooding event and subsequent search and recovery missions, ARES members have been deployed to serve in many different counties, including hard-hit Kerr and Kendall Counties. Mutual aid has been offered between several surrounding ARRL sections.







Planning Ahead for August

For those who are new to this newsletter, this segment allows for an ongoing look at spreading the cost of preparedness supplies over a year rather than trying to acquire everything all at once. Also included are measures you can take to prepare for any emergency/disaster. For those who have been receiving our newsletter, it provides the opportunity to review and update your supplies and plans.

Items to locate or purchase

1-2 packages of freeze-dried vegetables

1-2 packages of freeze-dried fruits

2 packages of freeze-dried meat

1 large can of juice

1 box of high-energy snacks

Dried fruits and nuts

Favorite spices in small, sealable bags, labeled and packaged together

Comfort foods (candy bars, cookies, etc.)

Actions to take

Make sure all food items are labeled with expiration dates or best used-by dates. Store them such that they can be rotated, bringing older items to the front to be used first. Keep an inventory of all supplies. If items are used, be sure to replace or replenish them.
