Topping off the Fair, Bill Swander and Sue Ryan provided a set of three excellent programs in the library.


CERT 3rd Quarter Workshop

Our 3rd quarter CERT workshop was conducted on August 28th as a search and rescue/triage-first aide/communications exercise at the Cama Beach cabins.



Information for this portion of our newsletter comes from NW Meteorologist Ted Buehner; from NOAA; from the National Weather Service; from Island County Department of Emergency Management; and from the Climate Prediction Center.

The weather outlook for the Pacific Northwest is a continuation of warm, dry conditions through September. Please note that the Level 2 Burn Ban remains in effect. With such dry conditions, we have already seen a number of fires sparked along I-5, as well as some brush fires on Camano. Don't contribute to these fires by irresponsible burning or by flicking your cigarettes out of your car window. And please avoid using weed burners!

We Should Be Prepared For How Long!?

Once upon a time, the recommendation was for individual households to be prepared for seven to ten days. That's an excellent beginning and should get people through most severe weather conditions. However, it is no longer considered sufficient for the event of a major disaster. Now, the recommendation for those of us living on Camano is for a minimum of a month, preferably two months. If you question the reason behind this, consider just how easily we could be isolated from the mainland and add to that the fact that, not being a major population center, we are not at the top of the list for receiving outside assistance.

As you prepare your household supplies, we also recommend that you add a little more than what you expect to need. This will allow you to assist a neighbor, should their home be so damaged as to make their supplies inaccessible. If everyone plans and prepares in such a manner, our entire community will be stronger and more resilient.

In addition to food and water supplies, each household should also keep first aid supplies on hand, and not the ones you buy at the store. For the most part, they contain little more than a thousand and one band aids in different sizes. Follow our monthly Planning Ahead column and it will assist you in purchasing those items that are most useful.



Another important consideration is the fact that, in those first few minutes and hours following a disaster you are most likely to encounter serious injuries for which trauma supplies might be required. Work with your neighborhood to build a store of such supplies. They should include materials for splinting and materials for serious bleeds including tourniquets. Take first aid and Stop the Bleed courses to learn how to properly use these materials.

We all hope that no such occasion arises in our lifetime, but the risk exists for it to happen at any time.. Prepared households and prepared neighborhoods are the key to surviving.

Planning Ahead for September

For those who are new to this newsletter, this segment allows for an ongoing look at spreading the cost of preparedness supplies over a year rather than trying to acquire everything all at once. Also included are measures you can take to prepare for any emergency/disaster. For those who have been receiving our newsletter, it provides the opportunity to review and update your supplies and plans.

Items to locate or purchase

Pet carriers and leashes in case evacuation is necessary

Extra pet food, water, and pet supplies

Pet IDs and photos (it is good to have a photo of you with the pet)

Pet vaccination records

Pet-safe deicer in preparation for the colder months

Fuel for generators, fireplaces, and/or woodstoves

Actions to take

Keep all pet vaccinations up to date and store the records with the pet photos along with your disaster supplies. Pets can become traumatized in times of





disaster and may escape. Having them microchipped and wearing tags, as well as having proper vaccination records and photos can help you be reunited.

Make sure your generator, fireplace, or woodstove functions properly. Pay attention to severe weather warnings and have sufficient fuel on hand to get through power outages.

Take a CERT course and learn what items are needed for a CERT Go-Pack. This will carry you through from the steps covered in Neighborhood Ready to assisting your family and your neighborhood in the hours and days following a disaster.
